



**Little Charmers - Redwork Individuals**

Redwork is very simple. It requires just one color of thread to sew out the entire design. The first redwork was actually done with red thread on a white background in the 1800's. Today, you can choose any color you like for your embroidery.

Since these designs are so "light" in terms of density, they require only a single layer of stabilizer. We use one layer of tear away stabilizer hooped with the fabric. Text designs may need more stabilizer - the longer the saying, the more support is needed.

Where a design has more than one color stop, this is to prevent jump threads from getting tangled up in the sewout. When your machine stops, just start again with the same color. There may be some jump threads on the snowman but we planned these very carefully so that none get trapped and they will be very easy to trim.

For text designs, each line will stop at the end and tie off stitches. The machine will move to the beginning of the next line and wait for you to start up again. This allows you to change colors if you want, or to continue along with the same color.

If you decide to use these on fleece, we would recommend placing one layer of a rinse away (wash away) stabilizer on top to prevent the threads from sinking down into the fleece.

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
