Filmmaker Katrina Browne discovers that her New England ancestors were the largest slave-trading family in U.S. history. The film follows as she and nine cousins retrace the Triangle Trade, from their old hometown in Rhode Island, to slave forts in Ghana, to the ruins of family plantations in Cuba. Step by step they uncover the vast extent of Northern complicity in slavery and gain powerful new perspectives on the black/white divide. The film contributed to passage of resolutions in the Episcopal Church to atone for the Church's role in slavery; it is now being used in parishes and Dioceses throughout the U.S. It is also serving as a tool for dialogue in schools, universities, museums, conferences, and workplaces, both in the United States and overseas.
