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The house where Hugo lives in Gehée, has got a strange story:



Hugo's greatgrand father captured

a German soldier during the Second World War. It was at the end of the war and it lasted for 8 months.

The soldier was accommodated and fed and, in exchange, he worked with Hugo's grandmother at the farm. The man slept in the barn of the property. He wasn't unhappy even if he wanted to see his girlfriend who lived in Germany next to the Alsacian border. He didn't have any children. His name was Ernest. Currently, Hugo and

his family are living in this house and his great-grandfather is still alive: he told Hugo about this story.



At the time, it wasn't unusual to see French families living with a German prisoner. In fact, these soldiers were called "prisoners" but their lives were not very hard. They were free as long as they stayed on the French families' properties. They had to work for these families but in exchange they were fed and accommodated (sometimes they even had their own room). It was better than fighting on the front and risking to be killed!
