GREETINGS - HEADMISTRESS!

"I have never abused my power of speech. I don't like making speeches. I prefer, by nature, to be more present on the operational level, discreetly and silently. But I thought it appropriate, this time, in spite of the restrictive measures of COVID, to take some time to speak to you, the last pupils of the Istituto San Giovanni Evangelista, to the teachers of today and yesterday, to all the school staff whom I have had the opportunity to meet over the years.

I will not abuse your listening patience and I hope I will not bore you.

Today is one of those days when there are, in all of us, conflicting emotions: In you, the pupils, there is the joy of the conclusion of a journey in your lives and at the same time also the sadness, still barely perceptible, for an unrepeatable phase of your lives, with the inevitable abandonment of knowledge, habits, routines to which, in the years to come, you will look back with nostalgia, with affection; in us, there is the satisfaction of having worthily completed a commitment made to you and to your parents and also the sadness for an experience that concludes, however, a great mission of the Marist Fathers in Rome.

It is worth remembering that ISGE's 'adventure' began in 1948, in the midst of the post-war period, when human, civil and religious reconstruction needed to be considered alongside material reconstruction.

It was a time when large agglomerations were being built outside the historical centre, and most of them still lacked structures. The Marist Fathers, urged on by the Vicariate of Rome, bought a 11,000 square metre plot of land in the new district of Piazza Bologna and, with enormous sacrifices, built a school and parish church and set up sports fields that proved, and continue to prove, providential for the area. The building was constructed in 1948 and the school began in 1949. Underlying this choice was the conviction of the Founder of the Society of Mary, Father Jean Claude Colin, who said that, through education, one collaborates with God in the formation of the human person, as in a second creation.

Our Marist Fathers have interpreted the vision of the Founder in the best possible way, from the first to the last day of school, carrying out in their "IGNOTI E QUASI OCCULTI" way a very precious service to so many generations of children and young people. We wanted this day to be held together for one reason: to express our affection, our gratitude, our appreciation and our

appreciation to them, to the Marist Fathers. These are the feelings that prevail today. We are happy for what has been done, for what has been sown, for the road that has been travelled.

The Holy Mass celebrated today is not the usual end-of-year Mass, it is a Mass of thanksgiving and joy for what has been achieved.

Some time ago, I received a letter from a person I do not know, but which struck me very much. I want to read it to you because it is from there that the idea of today's day started, and the joy that I feel prevails over the sadness, which is certainly not absent.

It is the joy that comes from knowing that we have done everything we could, right up to the end, right up to the last day. This is the letter:

"I attended ISGE from 1997 to 2004, first the Middle School and then the Classical High School, until I graduated in the 2003/2004 school year.

I am deeply grateful to the Marist Fathers and to the teachers I had, for the scholastic preparation and method of study they taught, which enabled me to cope brilliantly with university studies.

Even more, I am truly grateful for the human, Christian and ethical aspect of the training, for the constant attention to respect for others, to the value of the uniqueness of each person, to the exercise and care of ethics in relationships, in study and in work that they have been able to transmit.

Teachings that are rooted, alive in me, that I remember and try in my own small way to apply.

I will never be grateful enough to my parents who believed in the Marist educational mission and enrolled me in San Giovanni. I have been truly blessed.

Roberta's is an important message, which made me reflect a lot and so, FROM THAT REFLECTION, this FEAST OF THANKSGIVING that we are celebrating today began to take shape.

I contacted a number of former pupils, teachers, parents, administrative and school staff and asked them to write a thought, a sentence, a memory, a testimony that could express their relationship with San Giovanni. Something that came from the heart, without a doubt, without a doubt, but something that would be an expression of the past.

Something that came from the heart, without formality.

They did so, and what came out was an abyss of gratitude to the Fathers who have succeeded one another over the years. I will send all these thoughts to Father Martin, the Provincial, and I will give them to Father Antonio so that they can feel the satisfaction of the work done, so that they can feel the gratitude, the recognition, the affection, the closeness that so many people feel towards them.

Every action carried out in these years has the profound sense of the germination of seeds.

The Fathers have been a little like farmers, preparing the soil (the time of discernment), sowing (the time of formation), waiting (the time of expectation, of reflection), trusting in the mercy of the weather (the time of trust in God), working hard (the time of activity), reaping the fruits (the time of harvest). And then there is the time of thanksgiving.

Many other Fathers have certainly filled the corners of San Giovanni, sowing goodness, seriousness and respect. Our thanks go today to all of them, "unknown and almost hidden".

From the letters I have received there emerges the style that has characterised these years of educational activity. From all of them emerges the sense of "community", of "family", of joy, of serenity, of trust, of human "promotion" that the fathers have been able to create in the pupils, in the teachers, in the school staff. It is not a common style and is therefore all the more precious.

ATTENTION LISTENING WELCOMING: these have been our watchwords. There is also a common trace of gratitude in the words that parents, former pupils, former teachers have sent us.

In all these years the world has come and gone from San Giovanni.

What do I want to say? I would like to say that many figures have brought their prestige, their value, their professionalism and their charisma to meet the pupils of our school. It is impossible to

mention all the personalities, but it is impossible not to mention the meeting in the school gymnasium with Pope John Paul II in 1983 or the meeting with the President of the Republic, Sandro Pertini, in 1984, and then the many personalities from the world of culture or sport who wanted to bring their experience and their testimony into San Giovanni.

And the world came out of San Giovanni. I am referring to the many generations of students who have come out of here to live their lives in society, to pursue their professions, to make a name for themselves through their training, taking with them a little of the style that characterised San Giovanni. Young people like yourselves who today are writers, artists, directors, teachers, priests, professionals in various fields and who continue to carry out that mission of 'collaboration with God' that was their formation.

"TODAY EVERYONE OF US BRINGS WITH US NOT SO MUCH A MEMORY OF SAINT JOHN, BUT A SEED, A PRECIOUS CORN" writes Carlo D'Amicis, a former pupil, writer and RAI collaborator whom we have often met here at school and in the television studios, where many of our pupils have had the opportunity to meet and interact with so many personalities from the cultural world.

And he is right. Together with our memories, we carry with us a precious kernel that will bear fruit throughout our lives, which will not be exhausted in a single harvest but will continue to sprout. Always. That is the power of education, of good education.

This is the thanks we all give to the Marist Fathers.

I would like to add my own.

Eight years ago, when I arrived here called by the Fathers to run the School, I thought that the task would last no more than three years. They have not been easy years, there is no point in hiding it. In every institution there are days, bright periods and others that are more tiring, more difficult, harder. And those first three years were tiring, difficult, hard. When the congregation then had to realise, for various reasons, that it was no longer sustainable to continue the scholastic mission, it would have been much easier for me to conclude my experience and return quietly to my life. Instead, I wanted to continue until the end, until my last day, to share with the community of Saint John every moment of difficulty, every anxiety linked to the material life of each one, to reassure, to make each one feel how important and precious each one is.

Running a school of 1,500 pupils, as I did before coming here, is demanding. But it is no less demanding, I assure you, to run a school, a very small one, like this one here today, gathered in this chapel.

I am happy to have been with you, right to the end, and, together with my thanks to the Marist Fathers, I thank you all, pupils large and small, parents, teachers, professors, school staff, administrative staff.

Like all of you, I too will carry with me not so much a memory as a living seed that grows and germinates. And which reproduces itself throughout life.

Thank you all.

Father Martin, the Provincial, and Frank Dowling, the Marist contact person for education, have sent us a small souvenir gift from St John's. I thank them for their sensitivity and will be pleased to give it to each of you.

"During the penultimate year of high school, Father Sergio Velucchi (who, more than the other Marists, maintained relations with those who had already left the institute) suggested that my classmates and I play football against former students. Most of them were 24-25 year olds, but I remember perfectly well that, before taking to the field, we studied a tactic based on resistance: they were old, they would soon get tired and we would wear them out...

I tell you this little episode to make you understand the way in which my companions and I at that time, at seventeen years old, looked beyond the shadow line represented by the end of our studies. Unbelievable changes were waiting for us, we would have been exhausted at the age of twenty-five and then who knows how many other metamorphoses we would have encountered, for better or for worse: epochal events that would have inexorably taken us far from our youth...

We were prepared for everything, except for the state of mind that I felt today as I returned to the walls of St John the Evangelist to celebrate the closure of this glorious institute (a momentous event). I am talking about the state of mind of someone who, at a certain point in his life, clearly realises that, given the time that has passed and all the things that have happened, no metamorphosis has really taken place and that in a certain part of himself (the most important part, I would say) the 57-year-old of today is not at all different from the boy of forty years ago.

This awareness, let me be clear, has nothing to do with nostalgia for times gone by, nor with clumsy and somewhat ridiculous youthful pretensions. Rather, it has to do with the awareness, which becomes clearer and clearer as one moves on, that youth is a kind of inextinguishable and irreducible kernel, and that from there, even in old age, our curiosities, our dreams, our passions continue to spring.

The endurance of this kernel in adulthood, I believe, has a lot to do with the way the kernel has been planted, cared for, watered. And it is for this, above all, that I am grateful to St John the Evangelist and to the many years, from third grade to the classical maturity, spent in its classrooms. Because every effort made by my teachers to make me grow up (among the many, I remember the teacher Antonino Trifirò, Father Maccarini and then Father Ballario in high school, and again - among the

laity - Professor Giulio D'Onofrio of philosophy) was never separated from the preservation of this precious core.

I do not have enough experience of religious orders to know whether this is a characteristic of the Marist Fathers, or of this specific community of priests (and of the teachers they chose), but I do know for certain that in their teachings - whether they were inspired by the school curriculum or by precepts of life - there was always a gap, something traceable to the serene awareness that human nature is imperfect, and that precisely for this reason it is good that it encounters divine grace.

In the serious work of San Giovanni I have known, there was always room for irony, in the order there was always room for something out of place, in the community there was always room for the diversity of each individual. Historically, perhaps progressive and post-conciliar influences could have been discerned in that way of doing school and promoting the faith (I entered San Giovanni Evangelista in 1971, only four years after the publication of Don Milani's Letter to a teacher and his Barbiana boys), but I prefer to think that it was a sensitivity independent of the winds of history, to which the students themselves contributed, as well as the teachers and Marist fathers. Even those who were convinced that they were better than the others, because they were richer, better at school, or simply cooler, over time conformed to a dominant spirit, to a genius loci that prevailed in this place, through which passed the concept that we were all equal, and - above all - that everyone was equal in his own way...

Fifty years have passed, I repeat, since the first time I set foot in St John the Evangelist, and my arguments may seem dusty and dated. But, if you know how to see them, life always draws circles, and the circle that brings me back here today, as an old boy, passes through an unequivocal sign of destiny: it will be my wife Laura, for four years a physical education teacher in this institute (and with the surname Evangelisti), who will ideally close the last classroom (the same one where I entered in the year of her birth) and the gym in which I learned to love sport.

In her, in the way she has always lived her relationship with her children - a girl herself in their midst - I find confirmation of the existence of a principle, of a style, of a soul, which governs and has always governed this place. And that today each one of us, not as a memory but as a precious kernel, takes away with us".
